



The Art of Assessment with Dr. John Burge by Amy Boyes

As music teachers, we are constantly required to assess our students' performances. Sometimes we have a leisurely hour to explain a concept or help a student discover a new piece but, more often that not, we only have a few minutes to communicate our thoughts. For teachers who also adjudicate, examine or give master classes, the ability to succinctly communicate is vital to the success of the event.

In The Art of Assessment event, five teachers assessed five student performances and then were, in turn, assessed by Dr. Burge. This "doublemaster class" approach provided teachers feedback on their assessments. Frequently referring to time management and age and level appropriateness, Dr. Burge suggested that the assessors initially base their remarks on the music rather than



focusing directly on the performer. As the assessor explains points of interest from the score, he or she can then make suggestions to the student how they might improve their performance. Throughout the morning, Dr. Burge had many helpful suggestions to the fifty teachers attending but returned several times to the importance of keeping comments brief and maintaining a simple, straight-forward style of explanation.

Students ranging from Grade 1 to Diploma Level performed a varied repertoire of Bach, Clementi, Le Couppey, Debussy, and Prokofiev. Our thanks to their teachers, Danielle Jersak, Yuko Soncini-Koizumi, Carole Marsal and Ioulia Brechen, for encouraging them to participate in this ORMTA event. Also many thanks are owed to the assessors, Olivia Riddell, Rebecca Wang, Danielle Jersak, Laura Hawley, and Katarina Jovic for their excellent assessments. Finally, thanks to volunteers, Ann Empey, Betty Harris, Olivia Riddell, Tania Granata, and Cheryl McDonald, for assisting throughout the morning.

The family of Honourary Lifetime ORMTA Member, **Barbara Ross**, who passed away March 19th.

Ann Babin: Winner of the 2014 ORMTA Contribution to Teaching Award by Tania Granata

Ann was born and raised in northern New Brunswick where her early years were focused on family, school, music, sports and church. Piano studies and choir were supported and encouraged. She obtained a BA in literature and history from the University of New Brunswick and a Masters in Library and Information Services from Dalhousie University. A promising career in management at the NB Library Services was cut short when military husband Winston was posted to CFB Lahr (then West) Germany.

Several years later she was back in Lahr with two young sons and a part-time job at the small base library which included hosting a local TV, show *Books in Review*. There were excellent resources on the base and she decided to explore music further, resuming piano studies with Warren Mould. On the family's posting to Ottawa she continued piano with Diana Lawton and Sunju Koh and theory with the incomparable Bertha Bower and in 1998 received her ARCT (teacher) diploma. Ann joined the Gloucester Music Teachers' Association for support and development as she began establishing herself as a teacher in the Orleans area. At an early GMTA meeting she made a contact with MYC and in 1989 completed the training and added group teaching to her private home studio.



The five years just before and after 2000 were a blur of activity. Ann worked with Roxanne McGahey to establish the MYC studio on Youville Drive in Orleans, began a remarkable decade of piano studies with Barbara Solis, accepted the opportunity to serve as the Orleans representative for RCM Exams, joined ORMTA, enrolled in a year-long applied pedagogy programme taught by Dr. Gilles Comeau and Dr. Elaine Keillor, and took over the direction of the Canadian Music Showcase from former ORMTA president Shirley Efford. In 2002 Dr. Comeau invited Ann to continue her studies at the University of Ottawa at the Piano Laboratory that was literally under construction. She thrived in this challenging environment of work and study; her MA Music thesis on the history and development of the piano exam system in Canada is one of the Piano Lab's first.

Ann has served continuously on the ORMTA Executive Committee since 2003, as Branch President from 2009-2011, on Provincial Council from 2008-2011, and presently as Archivist. She loves conferences and considers herself a conference groupie. In 2013 she accepted a position on the board of directors for the Ottawa Children's Choir. She still maintains a busy home studio. Ann is both humbled and thrilled that her colleagues nominated her for this award.

Adult Student Workshop and Vocal Master Class by Carol Ann Wood, Convenor

An enthusiastic group of adult singing students and their teachers assembled for a Workshop and Vocal Master Class on Saturday, March 8th. The event was led by Ottawa mezzo-soprano and vocal teacher, Donna Klimoska. In an intimate morning workshop which was attended by seven participants, Donna shared her accumulative knowledge and research of the Alexander technique and Tai Chi movements which she incorporated into her own vocal studio throughout her teaching years. The group cheered on each participant as they took their individual turn with Donna using the techniques. We had some good exercise and hearty laughs!

In the afternoon Vocal Master Class, the group was joined by two more observers and two additional singers. The vocal repertoire included a variety of vocal genres: a modern Spanish duet for Soprano and Cello; 2 Handel arias; a Mozart operatic aria; and a Musical Theatre selection. Thank you to the singers who had the courage to air their repertoire for a most supportive audience. As well, many thanks to the accompanists for their dedicated playing: Anne Cure, cello; Tania Granata, piano; and Kathleen Howard, piano.

We appreciate the volunteers who contributed their time to make the event run smoothly: Kathleen Howard for writing out receipts, distributing programs and name-tags; Ann Babin for assisting in the final clean-up.

We are grateful to Donna Klimoska and thank her for opening her Glebe vocal studio and home to us for the Workshop which proved to be informative, interesting and fun; and for the Vocal Master Class in which Donna gave singers vocal technique ideas to draw on to improve their pieces and their singing.


Information Sharing Session

Kuan-Chih Hsu presented "Art of the Slow Practice" featuring ideas from Daniel Barenboim's book "A Life in Music". He raised many inspiring points including, "performance anxiety is like a virus, even a healthy body gets sick sometimes." Catherine Donkin explained how she uses the "Piano Explorer" magazines in her studio. Kathleen Prochnau presented her idea about "One being the loneliest number", talking about how to take the "solo" private lesson and teach students how to perform in duets.
