

Information Sharing Session

On Feb. 27th over 20 teachers gathered for the final Information Sharing Session of the season. The morning began with Sonja Deunsch Plourde and her Italian spinetta. After a brief description of the small harpsichord's qualities, Sonja invited all present to have a little "hands on" experience with the instrument. Sonja then performed two of the unmeasured preludes of Louis Couperin, impressing all with the musical qualities of the instrument. A hand-out of Prelude #7 was shared for teachers to use with their students, perhaps as a quick-study to provide a little peek into this early keyboard style.

Our morning continued with Elaine Keillor giving a fine overview of David Ledbetter's book, *Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier: The 48 Preludes and Fugues.* Elaine explained the main points of Ledbetter's introduction regarding instruments and tuning, and shared a very helpful outline of the book's main ideas. The preludes were given context by showing their possible prototypes, and Bach's use of sonata, dance, aria, and ritornello elements was discussed. The fugues were presented with explanations of style influences including the stile antico, the verset tradition, partimenti tradition, and elements of rhetorical scheme. Elaine praised this book for its scholarship, and teachers appreciated the introduction to it.

Elaine then moved on to a discussion of tempo in Bach, referring to Gerstenberg's work in the 1950's and a 2011 publication by Abravaya. She then performed the openings of the Preludes and Fugues listed as Grade 10, sharing her ideas on the relationship of tempo between the prelude and the fugue. Fascinating ideas and much food for thought!

Adult Students' Workshop and Master Class

On February 25, 2017 six adult students, their teachers and a few observers gathered for the workshop and master class at Ottawa Pianos. Catherine Donkin, an active teacher and performer, led the workshop entitled "Playing with confidence; techniques for working through memory slips and nervousness".

Catherine talked about the importance of solid preparation of the piece including some obvious yet often overlooked points like understanding key and structure of the piece, practicing hands separately and from different places to avoid memory slips. The students enjoyed the game "Seven stages of misery" when they had to play a part of their piece 7 times well, moving from one stage to the next. If they messed up, they had to move a step back. That means, if you want to play it only seven times, you would have to really focus and that is called deep practicing! The second part of the workshop was devoted to preparing for nervousness.

The workshop was followed by 6 master classes. Catherine had a special gentle and encouraging approach very appreciated by the adult students who demonstrated a lot of care and enjoyment in making music that was shining through.

The event took place at Ottawa Pianos who provided us with a beautiful 9-foot Yamaha Grand. Special thanks to Carmen Papalia.

The Recital will take place on Saturday, March 25, 2017 at City View United Church at 2:30pm.

Adrienne Shannon is a concert pianist, teacher, and multimedia artist. Originally from Toronto, she began her studies with Boris Berlin. Dr. Shannon completed a MMus at the Juilliard School with Ania Dorfman and a Doctor of Arts degree at Ball State University with Mitchell Andrews as her mentor.

Dr. Shannon has performed as a soloist, chamber music and duo pianist. As a member of has PALENAI Piano Duo with Joy Innis, she has toured across Canada, in Europe, the United States, Israel, the Ukraine, and Korea. Appearances with major Canadian orchestras include the Toronto Symphony, Mostly Mozart Orchestra, National Arts Center Orchestra, Edmonton and Victoria Symphonies, Calgary Philharmonic and Muncie Symphony.

Dr. Shannon has held a number of teaching positions. She was Piano Coordinator at the Royal Conservatory, and taught at Mount Royal College, Alberta College, Malaspina University, and Saint Leo University in Florida. In 2002, she and Dr. Innis initiated and developed a unique program for St. Lawrence College in Kingston called *Music & Digital Media*. Currently she teaches at the Dan School of Drama and Music at Queens University.

Adrienne Shannon believes artists can contribute to society in a diversity of ways. Between 1986 – 2002 she and Dr. Innis acted as Artistic Directors of the *Pacific Rim Summer Festival* on Vancouver Island which became one of "Canada's finest chamber music festivals" (Canadian Heritage). They also administrated *Festival on the St. Lawrence* and *Vienna: A Musical Heritage* (Calgary). Creative and environmental multimedia projects lead to awards and commissions from Parks Canada, the Sierra Club, Canada Council, Alberta Foundation, and the Telus Corporation (*Innovation in the Arts*).

Hailing from the UK, **Darrell Bryan** studied at Keele University (UK), and York University (Canada), specialising in vocal performance, conducting, and music education. During his studies, Bryan was the recipient of The Mervin Taylor Prize, the Keele University Choral Conducting Scholarship, the Royal Dolton Scholarship, and most notably Student of the Year (2010) for outstanding academic achievement and contribution to music education.

As a conductor and vocalist, Bryan has had the opportunity to work with perform and teach across Canada, in addition to appearances in the UK, France, Germany, China, Australia and the USA. Bryan currently resides in Kingston, Ontario where he is a member of teaching faculty at The Dan School of Drama & Music at Queen's University.

As a voice teacher Darrell focuses on vocal health and efficient use of the voice across all vocal genres. Having studied extensively with vocal clinicians in the U.S.A., Canada, and Europe, Darrell uses an understanding of current vocal science to ensure students are making healthy, informed and positive steps in their vocal development. Teaching students of all ages, Darrell believes that all styles of music and performance benefit from a healthy vocal production and solid vocal technique.

In addition to his work at Queen's University, Bryan runs a busy private voice, piano and theory studio, and offers musical consultation, adjudication, performance and musical theatre direction across Ontario.
